ICONIC PHOTO OF A JANUARY DAY IN HISTORY

ASA's 25th manned Space Shuttle mission was scheduled for launch on January 22, 1986. After 25 previous successful missions, these flights had become rather routine. Live television coverage of the launches had ceased as the public had lost interest all the launches pretty much looked the same. But this launch was televised live because for the first time a civilian would be part of the crew of seven. Florida school teacher *Christa McAuliffe* would be on-board this mission. She would be conducting science experiments in a zero-g environment while in orbit; these would be televised live for students to see during school hours.

For various reasons the launch was rescheduled six consecutive days (January 22->23->24->25->26->27->28). As each delay was announced, NASA was the subject of increased pressure by the media networks to get on with the mission.

January 28, 1986 was an unusually cold morning at launch complex 39A at Cape Kennedy, FL. The temperature of 30°F was far below the previous low shuttle launch temperature of 54°F. Morton-Thiokol (manufacturer of the booster rockets used on the shuttle missions) engineers had not qualified the booster rocket O-rings for launch at temperatures below 40°F, and advised NASA to not launch that morning. They were overruled.

On the launch pad was the space shuttle Challenger, fully fueled and awaiting take off. Inside their pre-launch quarters the seven


astronauts were making preparations for the mission. The above photograph shows on their way to the launch pad to board the shuttle. *Christa McAuliffe* is second from the right.

The shuttle launched at 11:38 a.m. EST. It exploded 73 seconds into the mission, 46,000 above the Atlantic Ocean, into which it fell. The cause was a failure of one of the O-rings at liftoff. NASA cameras captured the failure - a puff of fuel vapor from the O-ring site that grew larger as the flight progressed until an explosion occurred. In addition to those who attended the launch (including McAuliffe's parents), approximately 41 million television viewers, including school children around the country.

The disaster resulted in a full investigation and significant changes in NASA's launch and safety procedures as well as launch vehicle design changes. A 32 month hold on missions resulted, resuming in September, 1988.

Christa McAuliffe is now recognized as a hero and pioneer in education and space exploration. Approximately 40 schools have been named after her worldwide, as well as many scholarships. In 2004 she was posthumously awarded the Congressional Space Medal of Honor.

A second disaster occurred in February, 2003 during reentry of the shuttle Columbia which disintegrated during reentry over the southwestern United States due to a piece of foam insulation breaking off from the external fuel tank and striking the left wing during liftoff. While successfully completing its space mission, it had caused enough damage to allow hot gases to enter the wing upon reentry resulting in the breakup of the shuttle. The crew was lost.





TIP OF THE MONTH

Submitted by Lance Lagoni

This is kind of a somewhat farcical, long route to saying what *Thomas Edison* put so succinctly — "This is not failure. Rather it is a reduction of the universe of possible solutions by one." Many have suggested that we learn more by our failures, which we tend to remember, than by our successes which fall by the wayside and from our memory. I want to make failure a long-forgotten cousin — not my friend. One should certainly not fall victim to being discouraged by failure, for often little is really accomplished without the struggle to succeed.

We photographers are engaged in the creation of artistic expression (whatever that means) through the use of technical processes. I believe the word 'process' is quite important. Focus, frame, shoot, ISO, aperture, shutter speed – these are all snippets of process. They must become muscle memories that are always used. In the long run, they must not become a labored effort or the focal point the total process. They would then be impediments that must be removed from the path of progress.

Just as a pilot has a pre-flight checklist, so must we have a pre-shot checklist – film $\sqrt{}$, camera $\sqrt{}$, tripod $\sqrt{}$, lens(es) $\sqrt{}$, ... This is all part of the process to be prepared and followed. The more we anticipate, the more we will be prepared. The bottom line is to think – think what we need to do to achieve the desired result. Then execute the process.

Process must not become a production line through which we create drive. We should not be focused on using it as an end result. We are engaged in the creation of artistic expression. Our artistic expression can be small in scope or expansive in scope. It is more a laboratory or a handmade effort rather than a production line. In my experience, far too many in the photographic world seem to view success as technical or mechanical perfection.




