# From camera to computer

by Royal Pitchford



t the February meeting, CLCC member Royal Pitchford made a terrific presentation on what to do with your images once you have taken them and uploaded them off of your SD card. Here is a sample of the slides from Royal's presentation. They read in rows from left to right.

# This is where you start managing your images

Depending how often you shoot and how many images you'll accumulate over the next couple or years:

- A. Do you treat your SD card like a hard drive, importing images straight off the card and into your processing program?
- B. Transfer images to the internal hard drive on your computer?
- C. Transfer images to a cloud drive?
- D. Transfer images to an external hard drive?

#### The joy of managing your images

Start every processing session by plugging in your dedicated external hard drive:

- Reserve this drive for images, videos and photo-related documents (such as shot lists, notes
  on locations, model releases, etc.)
- · You know exactly where to transfer new images from your SD card
- · You know exactly where your previously transferred images are found
- · Your processing software will know where to find them too!
- At the end of your processing session, unplug the drive so you don't accidentally use it as a general-purpose drive
- Label your dedicated external hard drive, for example:
   Drive #1 / August 2023 to \_\_\_\_\_\_\_.

#### This is where you start managing your images

Depending how often you shoot and how fast you accumulate images each year:

- A. An SD card? It's not built to be used like a working hard drive.
  - o It could fail if you treat it like one
  - Many processing programs set a link to the file location from which you import the image – it's how the program finds the image (or images) next time
  - You may want to put it back in the camera and shoot some more, so you and your processing app can lose track of where your images are
- B. The internal hard drive on your computer can work, but it can fill up fast
- C. A cloud drive can be a good solution but can get expensive over time
- D. A dedicated external hard drive is relatively economical, reliable and can help you organize your images, especially if it's only for photos and photo-related documents

# Think about folders before you transfer the first image

- Think of names for folders that make sense as categories for the images you are ready to transfer
- · Then create those folders before you transfer any images from the SD card
- · Create more specific subfolders

# Think about folders before you transfer the first image

Everyone has their own way of categorizing their images, such as:

- Travel
- · Holidays and birthdays
- Family (or Kids and Grandkids)
- · Wildlife and Landscapes
- Flowers
- Pets

You might also think in terms of:

- · Time (e.g., months and years)
- Locations (e.g., location of travel, or the family farm, or the place you visit every winter)
- Activities (skiing, boating, rock climbing)

# Organize folders to support your processing and exports

For example:

- Travel
  - · Los Angeles
    - 2016
      - Venice Beach
        - RAW files (or Assets): unprocessed—you may not import all into editing program

A key "don't"

Don't import your images and

process them, and then think,

"Where should I save the exports?"

- Processed images: Might still be RAW; consider this optional, but if you
  might want two different versions of the same image (e.g., v1 and v2)
- Exported images: JPEG (usually) or DNG (digital negative) Don't mix these with your digital assets/RAW files

# Organizing the drive helps in several ways

- It helps you avoid the spur-of-the-moment approach to organizing that you don't remember (or makes no sense to you) next week
- You take time to think about the work you've created it may call attention to what you like most in your photography
- When you go looking for a certain category or image or images of a time or place, YOU CAN FIND WHAT YOU'RE LOOKING FOR

# When you get a new external drive, give it a name

- · When you get a new hard drive, label it a shipping label or some white duct tape
- Give it a number over the years, you might need several plus the start date, with space for an end date.
- · Don't get such a large-capacity drive that scrolling the folders is a chore
  - Starting up an 8 terabyte drive can take a long time once you've got a couple of years' worth of images
  - You'll have little sense of your own progress...the early stuff and the more accomplished recent stuff is all in there together – go straight to the good stuff with a smaller drive
  - o Your working drives will be more manageable at 1 or 2 terabytes (or 4, if you shoot a lot of video)
- You need a back-up system maybe that 8 terabyte drive... it's a topic for another time

Each person may enter up to two postcard entries. Digital postcard entries must be JPEGs 1621 pixels wide by 1080 pixels tall, or 720 pixels wide by 1080 pixels tall, to conform with a standard postcard aspect ratio of 6 inches x 4 inches for horizontal image postcards and 4 inches x 6 inches for vertical image postcards. Maker-added text will be required.

Creating a postcard is an easy, inexpensive photo activity that everyone, no matter their photographic skill level, can participate in and learn from. The postcard competition provides for photographic fun, creativity, and the possibility of related local chapter programs. It is also another opportunity for everyone to directly get their images entered in a CACCA competition.

Submission must be made no later than noon on Sunday, April 13, 2025. CLCC is a member of CACCA, so any CLCC member can enter this competition.




